STUDENT AGENDA USAGE

Student Agenda/Handbook

Each student from Kindergarten to 7 must own his/her own personal Student Agenda/Handbook. The agenda includes a copy of the École Mountain View School Handbook, which provides information about the school such as, important dates, student expectations, school activities and more. The cost for each agenda is \$8.00.

The agenda that each student at Mountain View is required to have serves many purposes. It is meant to be:

- 1. A primary communication tool between home and school.
- 2. A tool for recording school assignments.
- 3. A tool which promotes and teaches good organizational habits.
- 4. A carrier for notes, newsletters, and other information coming home from school.
- 5. Character Education information for students; Virtues and "7 Habits of Effective Teens."
- 6. An information resource for students. (maps, quizzes, games, interesting web sites, multiplication grid etc...)

In order to better meet the learning needs of the students, enhance home – school communication, and to facilitate consistency for parents with children in more than one class we are asking that each stakeholder be responsible for the following:

Students are to:

- make sure the agenda is brought back and forth from home to school every day
- make sure that all assignments are recorded before taking the agenda home
- make sure assignments are checked off when complete
- right ensure that a parent/guardian checks and initials the agenda daily

Parents/Guardians:

- check to see that assignments are being recorded and checked off when completed
- initial your child's agenda on a daily basis
- > use the agenda as a primary communication tool between yourself and your child's teacher

Teachers:

- > will check agendas regularly for appropriate use, parent initials and any communication from home
- will respond in a timely fashion to any communication from home
- > provide time for students to record the appropriate information in their agendas



BEHAVIOUR REPORTS

As part of keeping parents informed of their child's education, Behaviour Reports will be sent home the last school day of each month in September, December, January, March and May. These reports provide regular information on work habits, behaviour and attitude. These are in addition to the report cards sent in December, March and June.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

Students are expected to:

- ➤ Follow within the School Code of Conduct upon which our Discipline Policy is developed.
 - Show respect for self and others
 - Inappropriate language and bullying will not be tolerated.
- Arrive at school and classes on time and be prepared to learn.
 - This includes having pencils, paper etc. for classes and wearing a pair of indoor shoes.
 - Students in grades 4 7 are expected to change into shorts/sweat pants & t-shirt with indoor running shoes for Phys. Ed. Classes.
- Electronic devices are not to be used at school unless it is under the direction of the classroom teacher for educational purposes.
 - Electronic device includes any device that is capable of sending or receiving calls or messages and devices that are capable of capturing digital images.

- Please refer to the Electronics Use at School Policy for further detail.
- Students are expected to work to their fullest potential, taking pride in their efforts and achievements along with responsibility for their behaviour.

COMMUNICATIONS

A newsletter will be published on the first school day of the month. It will include reminders of important dates, special activities and other information relevant to your child's education. The letter will be posted on the school web page: www.ecolemountainview.ca as well as being sent home. Our school web page will also include up to date information for activities on the calendar, latest news and Upcoming events sections. The web page is intended to be our most current source of information for parents and students, please take the time to check it out!

HOMEWORK PRACTICES

Our belief is that students should be able to complete all homework assignments independently. Parents can assist students by asking questions such as: What steps or questions do you find difficult? How do you plan to improve speed or accuracy? Parents should not have to help children complete assignments. Parents can assist their children by ensuring that there is a quiet area and consistent time available for homework or study. Also, parents are to ensure that homework is completed on time and to an acceptable standard. It is important when a student does not understand the work, to stop, and ask the teacher for assistance prior to continuing. Practicing incorrect methods will make it more difficult to correct later.

Purpose

- To provide additional opportunities for students to independently practice skills instructed in class
- Rote learning / memorization of facts
- Improve speed and accuracy of skills
- To prepare students for new learning or instruction
- Incomplete classroom assignments are not considered as homework.

Assessment

- All homework will be assessed for timely completion.
- All homework assignments will have corrective feedback, provided by the teacher or through peer or self-evaluation based on rubrics.
- Homework assignments are not graded for progress report marks.

SAFE & CARING AT MOUNTAIN VIEW

The main entrance is unlocked throughout the school day, from 8:00 – 4:00. Side entries remain locked throughout the school day. Teachers open doors for students to enter the school when the warning bell rings prior to the start of the school day and during all recess breaks. Supervisors will open side doors to allow students into the school in the event they need to use the washroom. In the event of cold weather (-20 C), side entries will be unlocked and students will be sent inside to start the day. Morning supervision begins when the first bus arrives, typically at 8:00. Please do not drop students off prior to 8:00 as they will be unsupervised on the school grounds.

Students will have Indoor Recess when the temperature and/or wind chill are -20 or below. In the event of extreme cold, school doors are always unlocked when the first bus arrives in the morning, students are sent in to the school when they arrive if temperatures are below -20. Please ensure that your child is dressed appropriately for the weather.

École Mountain View School is a <u>Closed Campus</u>. To help ensure student safety, students are not to leave the school grounds during the school day unless they are accompanied by a parent/guardian. Parents will be expected to sign their child out of the school for appointments or when leaving early due to illness or other reasons.

Parents are welcome and encouraged to become involved in our school. In the interest of student safety, all parents and visitors to the school must check in at the front office. Those staying in the school will be assigned a visitor's ID tag. We do advise that you arrange an appointment if you wish to meet with a teacher or an administrator. This ensures availability and time to discuss the topic at hand. Parents are also welcome to come out and help with any of our after school clubs and activities. The more the merrier!

LUNCH SUPERVISION

Students at École Mountain View School typically eat lunch at school. Supervision is provided by staff over the lunch period. Students are expected to eat at their desks, use an "indoor voice" and clean up after themselves. As part of our Closed Campus initiative, students are permitted to go out for lunch **ONLY** if a parent comes to the school, signs their child out and takes them for lunch.

ATTENDANCE

School attendance as stated in the School Act (2005) is compulsory for all children between the ages of six to sixteen years of age. Regular attendance and being on time are two factors that help your child have a positive attitude towards school. We will monitor attendance and contact parents by mail if attendance is below 85%.

It is very important that the school be notified as soon as possible if your child will be absent. Our "Safe Arrival" program means that if a student is not present and the school has not been notified by 8:45, a call will be made to verify the absenteeism reason. A call at your earliest convenience to the school secretary or our "safe arrival" line at 780-865-2628 will save time and help keep our students safe. You can also email us at emvsattendance@gypsd.ca to let us know of your child's absence.

ILLNESS AND ACCIDENTS AT SCHOOL

A child who is ill will not be sent home until it is determined that someone is at home to care for the child. Otherwise, the child is kept under supervision in the office until the parents have been contacted. **Therefore, it is important to enter work and emergency phone numbers on the registration forms.** Despite all precautions, accidents can occur at school. In all instances we try and contact the parents. When a parent cannot be reached and medical attention is required the child will be taken to a clinic or the hospital by a member of staff.

DRESS CODE

In order to promote favorable attitudes and an appropriate school tone, students must wear clothing in good taste. In general, students are to dress in clothes that are clean, tidy, contain no offensive or improper lettering, logos or slogans, and do not allow exposure of either undergarments or body parts. For example, girls do not wear belly shirts, tube tops, halter tops, see-through blouses or tops with spaghetti straps (3cm rule), low-slung jeans, short-shorts or miniskirts. Shorts and skirts should fall below finger tips when arms are straight at sides. Boys do not wear muscle T-shirts, cut-off or low rider jeans, or jeans that are sagging and expose underwear. Clothing with inappropriate language, logos and/or slogans printed on it are not acceptable. T-Shirts that promote violence, alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or bullying are inappropriate. Staff members have the authority to require a student to conform to the dress code of the school. Students that choose to dress inappropriately will be required to change, call home for appropriate clothing or be sent home to change and return to school.

SAFETY PATROL

ÉMVS participates in the Alberta Motor Association School Safety Patrol program. All students in grades 5 – 7 are encouraged to become Safety Patrollers. In addition to providing safe passage for their fellow students, the students participating in the ÉMVS Safety Patrol develop important qualities and personal skills including leadership and a sense of social responsibility.

BICYCLES, SKATEBOARDS, ETC.

Students who wish to ride their bikes, skateboards, scooters, or wear their roller blades to school are encouraged to do so. In the interests of safety, these students are expected to park their bikes in the bike rack upon arrival to school. Students are not able to ride their bikes during recess breaks. Our school expectation is that students need to wear appropriate safety equipment when using any of these modes of transportation, especially a properly fitted helmet.

AWARD CEREMONIES

Award ceremonies are held during the school year on the first Thursday of November, January, March and May. We have much to celebrate. Students will be recognized for exemplary behavior and demonstrating citizenship characteristics at these ceremonies. Your child's teacher will contact you prior to your child receiving an award so that you can join in the celebration. We also recognize students at the end of the school year for demonstrating exemplary behaviours and citizenship for the entire school year. Students will also be recognized for achievement and practicing Virtues within the classroom throughout the school year.

200 DAYS OF READING!

This program starts at the beginning of the school year! Students are encouraged to read recreationally or be read to for at least 15 minutes per day. The reading materials are of the student's choice, novels, magazines, comics, whatever they like to read. Sheets will be available from the homeroom teachers for students to record the number of days read, 50, 100, 150, and 200. There are incentives for participation at each level. Parents are asked to list the title and initial beside each day that their child reads for at least 15 minutes. When the sheet is completed, students exchange the completed sheet with their teacher for the next level. Please encourage your child to become involved in this program.

SCHOOL FEES

Our school fee structures for the 2017-18 year are different. The Instructional Material fees previously charged are no longer in effect. There are some fees that are a cost recovery fee for enhanced programs such as Art and Outdoor Education. There are also fees for sports teams to assist in covering the costs of tournament entries and transportation. Students that are being assess these fees will have letters sent home to parents describing the need and purpose of the fee.

VIRTUES PROGRAM

At École Mountain View School we use an inclusive, virtues-based approach to help us bring out the best in students. Virtues are used to acknowledge, guide and correct. During the school year we will focus for two weeks on a particular virtue; such as Respect, Responsibility, Self-Discipline and Service. Ask your child about the virtue currently being focused upon.
